 - Be enrolled full time as a high school senior, graduating in 2018, planning to enroll in a college in the fall directly following graduation
 - Exhibit a strong commitment to pursue and complete a bachelor's degree at an accredited non-profit public or private institution in the United States (students may start their studies at a two-year institution and then transfer to a four-year institution)
 - Demonstrate critical financial need (\$55,000 or lower adjusted gross family income is required)
 - Be involved in co-curricular and community service activities
 - Display integrity and perseverance in overcoming adversity
 - Maintain a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 2.0; and
 - Be a United States citizen
- **2018 National Space Club & Foundation Keynote Scholar Application (Deadline Dec 1):** since 2013, The National Space Club and Foundation has offered the opportunity for a student to give the keynote address at the National Space Club and Foundation's annual Goddard Memorial Dinner, one of the space industry's most prestigious gatherings. The student must intend to pursue a career in the Science, Technology, Engineering or Mathematics (STEM) fields, be academically strong and excel in public speaking. In addition to speaking at the Goddard Memorial Dinner, the individual selected will also receive a scholarship, in the amount of \$10,000. ActSix Scholarship Program is an initiative of Urban Ventures and is Minneapolis-St. Paul’s only full tuition, full-need urban leadership award. 30-40 of the Twin Cities’ most promising urban leaders will be selected for scholarships for one of their four partner colleges: Augsburg College, Bethel University, North Central University, and University of Northwestern-St. Paul.

Applicants must be able to answer “yes” to the following questions:

- Will you graduate from high school in 2018, or did you graduate previously in 2017 or 2016?
- Do you live in the Twin Cities area and, if selected, could you arrange your own transportation to weekly evening trainings at Urban Ventures?
- Do you want to attend Augsburg, Bethel, North Central or Northwestern-St Paul?
- Are you not currently enrolled at a four-year college? (Students at two-year colleges may apply.)



- **2018 University of Minnesota Application Deadlines:** Fall 2018 applicants can apply to the University of Minnesota using only the Common Application, or the Coalition for Access, Affordability, and Success. Equal consideration is given to applicants across all three application types (students should only submit one application). Fall 2018 will be the first cycle with the Coalition application. They are proud to be a Coalition member school, given their long history of a strong commitment to student access and success.
- **Deadlines:** If you apply by **November 1st** you will get an earlier answer of acceptance or be put in the later deadline application pool. Around the time of their deadlines, they often experience a high volume of inquiries from students regarding the receipt of their supporting application materials. Based on feedback from the High School Advisory Committee, they are formalizing their practice of implementing a grace period for the

receipt of supporting application materials of November 15th – accepting October ACT scores sent directly from ACT.

- Second deadline: January 1st, with a supporting material deadline of January 16th. December ACT scores will be accepted from ACT.

The University of Minnesota - Duluth has begun processing fall semester 2018 applications. To ensure eligibility for scholarship consideration, it is important that students submit their application for admissions by their PRIORITY DEADLINE of December 1st. They recommend that all students apply for admission early for best program availability, as well as housing and orientation priority. Quick Guide: College Costs

There are five main categories of expenses to think about when figuring out how much your college education is really going to cost: tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, personal expenses, and transportation. You can control some of these costs to some extent. And when you know how much you'll need to spend on these expenses, it makes it easier to create a college budget.

- **Tuition and Fees** – These are the price you pay for taking classes at your college. This amount can change based on your academic program, the number of credit hours you take and whether you're an in-state or out-of-state student. Some colleges charge "comprehensive fees" — the total for tuition, fees, and room and board combined.
- **Room and Board** – Colleges usually offer a variety of dorm-room options and meal plans to students who live on campus. The charges vary depending on what plan you choose. If you decide to live at home or off-campus, you'll have your own rent and meal costs to consider in your college costs.
- **Books and Supplies** – You'll need books and other course materials. The yearly books-and-supplies estimate for the average full-time undergraduate student at a four-year public college is about \$1,200. You may be able to lower these costs by buying used textbooks or renting them.
- **Personal Expenses** – These include laundry, clothing, cell phone bills, eating out and anything else you normally spend money on. Figure out what you spend and add that amount to your budget.
- **Transportation** – Whether you commute to campus or take the occasional trip home, you'll have transportation costs. Of course, these will vary depending on how you travel and how often. You may be able to find student discounts on travel costs. Don't forget to factor in the cost of gas, insurance, and parking if you own a car.
